Stats from the 2010 Kansas Statistical Abstract:

Hispanic-Owned Firms in Kansas

- In 2007, Kansas had 5,775 Hispanic-owned firms with sales and receipts of over \$1.3 billion. 998 firms had 7,381 paid employees with an annual payroll of over \$198 million and sales and receipts of almost \$1.1 billion.
- From 2002 to 2007, the number of Hispanic-owned firms in Kansas grew 38% and their sales and receipts grew 94%. During the same time period, annual payroll for Hispanic-owned businesses increased by 52%.

Hispanic Population in Kansas by County

- In 2010, 10.5% of Kansas' population was Hispanic. The Hispanic population in Kansas grew 59.4% from 2000 to 2010, from 188,252 to 300,032.
- Seven counties in Kansas had Hispanic population of more than 10,000 in 2010: Sedgwick, Wyandotte, Johnson, Shawnee, Ford, Finney, and Seward counties. These counties account for almost 71% of the Hispanic population in Kansas.
- In 2010, more than half of the population in Seward (56.6%) and Ford (51.2%) counties was Hispanic.
- More than 20% of the population in 2010 was Hispanic in 12 Kansas counties: Seward, Ford, Finney, Grant, Stanton, Stevens, Hamilton, Kearny, Haskell, Wyandotte, Wichita, and Lyon counties. Ten of these 12 counties are located in southwest Kansas.
- 64 of Kansas' 105 counties experienced more than a 50% increase in Hispanic population from 2000 to 2010; 24 experienced more than a 100% increase.
- 77 counties in Kansas experienced population declines from 2000 to 2010. In 73 of those 77 counties, the Hispanic population grew during the same time period.
