



**Don Stull** is professor of anthropology at the University of Kansas, where he has served on the faculty since 1975. He holds a doctorate in anthropology from the University of Colorado and a master's in public health from the University of California, Berkeley.

For 25 years, his research and writing have focused on the meat and poultry industry, rural industrialization and rapid growth communities, industrial agriculture's impact on farmers and rural communities, and food. Don has authored or coauthored some 60 scholarly articles and chapters and 3 books, produced 3 nationally distributed documentaries, and edited or coedited 4 collections of original essays.

Much of his research and writing centers on the impact of immigrant workers and their families on rural communities. His most recent writings on this subject include "Meatpacking and Mexicans on the High Plains: From Minority to Majority in Garden City, Kansas" which appeared in *Immigrants Outside Megalopolis: Ethnic Transformation in the Heartland*, edited by Richard C. Jones (Lexington Books, 2008, written with Michael Broadway) and "Latinos in the Food Processing Industry," to be published later this year in the *Oxford Encyclopedia of Latinos and Latinas in Politics*. A second and expanded version of his book *Slaughterhouse Blues: The Meat and Poultry Industry of North America*, written with Michael Broadway, will appear early in 2012.

Stull has been coeditor of *Culture & Agriculture* (1996-1997), editor-in-chief of *Human Organization* (1999-2004), and president of the Society for Applied Anthropology (2005-2007). In 2001, he was presented with the Key to Garden City, Kansas, and made an honorary citizen in recognition of the contribution of his research to the progress and quality of life of the citizens of Garden City. He was the 2004 recipient of the Wally and Marie Steeples Faculty Award for Outstanding Service to the People of Kansas. He was recently elected to the board of directors of the Organization for Competitive Markets.
