


- Good news

 - Boeing leaving Wichita












- Mirrors the ups and downs of the national economy
 - Although the negative peeks are not as extreme in KS as the US economy
 - Ag, Mineral Extraction, and military expansion helped to buffer KS economy from the worst of the recession
 - Plus, KS did not have much of a housing bubble
- Uncertainty, however, is pervasive
 - Federal fiscal cliff
 - Price of Energy (gasoline)




Kansas Government Tax System






Tax Reductions 1995 to 2013 (in Millions)




Tax Cuts

- Three basic changes to income tax
 - Eliminate tax on pass through entities (\$180 million)
 - Reduce marginal tax rates from 6.45% to 4.9% (\$600 million)
 - Reinstate severance taxes and eliminate deductions for poor
- Allow sales tax to decline from 6.3% to 5.7% (\$400 million)




SGF: Current Projections Expenditures and Revenues

Kansas Politics?

- The pendulum has swung to the ideological right
 - Determine level of taxation first, then right size government to match tax revenues
 - Privatization, competition, and profit lead to efficiency
 - Government power is appropriately used to enforce a conservative vision of social order
 - Responsible party model is enforced




Kansas Politics?

- Can the Democrats become a viable alternative?




New Right Voting Structure


Estimated Factor Scores




Party Alignment
