

Douglas County Population



Population in Douglas County by Race




Overall Douglas County has 21% of the population who are non-white, not-Hispanic.




Population Under 18 by Race




There are 17,320 people under 18 in Douglas County:





Single parent households vary by race of householder.

Douglas County Education Compared to All Kansas Counties






 Douglas County—has one of the highest levels of high school graduates and college graduates in the state of Kansas.



Educational Attainment in Douglas County




3,066 residents age 25 and over lack a high school diploma or equivalency.




Overall 95.5% of residents have a high school education or higher this varies by race and ethnicity.




Douglas County Housing



Home Ownership 48.3% Compared to Kansas 66.3%






- Douglas County has the some of the highest housing costs in the state. Median rents are \$897.
- Median value of owner occupied housing is \$193,000.




Housing Tenure in Douglas County



Black households in Douglas County are half as likely to own their home as white households.




Housing Stability in Douglas County



Despite the disparity in ownership, white and black households moved at similar frequencies.




Median House Listing Price in the Region

- \$215,050 for State of Kansas




Median Gross Rent

Median Value of Owner Occupied Housing Units




 The median value of owner-occupied housing units in Douglas County is \$192,800




Douglas County Housing Costs as Share of Income


The Economic Policy Institute estimates the cost of a family of four to live in Douglas County is \$81,396

Median Household Income




- Median Household income in Douglas County is \$55,832

Median Income by Race of Householder




Median Family Incomes vary more widely by race than household incomes.



Douglas County Residents Commute for Work


- 56% of Douglas County residents work in the county.
- 44% of residents commute to work. More workers commute to the East with 17% working in Johnson County








Means of Transportation to Work




White workers are 4x as likely to work from home and 5x less likely to take public transportation to work as Black workers.



Douglas County Residents Lack Broadband Access






Between 13 – 21% of households within Douglas County School Districts have no Internet Subscription.




Douglas County Computer/Broadband Access

Douglas County Initial Unemployment Claims




Douglas County Initial Unemployment claims have been trending upward since Aug 1st.




Comparing the last week of January to the last week of October, initial unemployment claims from whites were 10x higher.


Douglas County Initial Unemployment Claims

Overall, Douglas County unemployment claimants are slightly more likely to be male.






Claimants are predominantly White.





Claimants are predominantly White though a greater share of non-white claimants are continued claims.






Using ACS data on workers by race we can estimate unemployment rates by race.


Blacks have higher unemployment rates.

Percent of People in Poverty in Douglas County






- The overall portion of Douglas County residents living in poverty is 18.7%
- 12.3% of children under 18 in Douglas County live in poverty
- Douglas County falls into the upper quartile for Kansas counties for people in poverty



Percent of Children in Poverty in Douglas County




Overall 12.3% of children under 18 in Douglas County live in poverty though non-white children are 2-4x as likely to be in poverty.

Douglas County SNAP and TANF Participation




Participation in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), have increased.

Douglas County SNAP Participation




The ACS contains self-reported participation which indicates nearly 30% of Black or African-American households participate in SNAP.


COVID-19 in Douglas County
