
Stimulus Spending in Kansas


Millions of Americans received an Economic Impact
Payment authorized by the
Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and
Economic Security Act
(CARES Act). This brief looks
at these stimulus payments
in Kansas.

Payments of \$1,200 per adult and \$500 per child were distributed to eligible U.S. citizens and resident aliens beginning on April 15, 2020. This resulted in a 16% boost to consumer spending in the first week.



How Kansans will or plan to primarily use stimulus payment




Sixty percent of Kansans responded that their household spent or plans to spend stimulus money on expenses, but this varies by race/ethnicity.




Stimulus Payments Start
